**About the course:** The field of public health ethics is an emerging area within the broader discipline of bioethics. It has taken shape as a niche area over about the past decade and a half.

We have developed public health ethics case studies from the Indian context and these are complemented by those from other contexts relevant to the course content. These serve as one of the key resources for the course.

The course aims to equip course participants with knowledge and skills in public health ethics. They would serve as significant human resource to take the learnings to their own ecosystems and facilitate knowledge transfer in public health ethics in their organization and peer networks.

Goal: This training is aimed at enabling public health students and researchers; and public health practitioners to apply public health ethics frameworks and principles to reason out new, difficult, or ambiguous cases/situations/scenarios towards resolving the issue at hand in morally discerning ways.

#### Specific learning objectives

- a. To understand the concepts of public, health, public health, and public health ethics and their distinctive features as opposed to clinical ethics.
- b. To learn the ethics principles and ethics theories in the context of public health ethics;
- c. To learn to identify, articulate, and analyze ethical issues arising from public health, and to formulate critical and well-reasoned ethical arguments
- d. To develop competence to participate in ethical decision-making as issues arise in public health practice, policy formulation, surveillance, and research.
- e. To know the existing national and international regulatory and public health governance framework/s, laws; and ethics guidance on public health ethics

#### **Learning methods**

- a. Interactive methods using case studies sourced and developed from within India to be complemented by those from outside of India.
- b. Interactive presentations by faculty using case examples embedded in presentations
